8. When you go through hard times, do you ever try to use good behavior to demand relief, rewards, or favor from God? How well did that work?

- 10. According to 2 Corinthians 4:16-18, what is the result of troubles? Without troubles, what would happen instead?
- 11. According to James 1: 2-3, what is the result of trials? Without trials, what would be the result instead?
- 12. Based on these verses, what do we gain from hard times that is temporary? What do we gain from hard times that is eternal?
- 13. Read 1 Peter 4:12-16. What does Peter tell believers to do when we face suffering? What reasons does he give?
- 14. Which of the verses from this study sticks out to you the most?

 How does seeing the purpose of suffering encourage you through hard times?
