- 3. Read Philippians 4:4 and I Thessalonians 5:16. How often should we rejoice in the Lord?
- 4. According to Luke 10:20-21, why were the disciples to be full of joy? Why was Jesus full of joy?
- 5. Read Matthew 13:44-46. Why were the men in the two parables full of joy? How is that like the kingdom of heaven?
- 6. Read Philippians 2:1-2. What was Paul (author) asking the believers to do? Why? Do you experience "complete" joy when believers are unified?

- 7. According to Romans 5:8-11, why should we rejoice?
- 8. In the NIV, the phrase "how much more" or "all the more" occurs 5 times in this chapter. "Not only is this so" occurs twice. What comparison is Paul (author) trying to make? How does that make you feel?
- 9. 2 Corinthians 3:7-11 makes a similar point. Should there be joy in seeing God's glory?
- 10. How often are you filled with joy for the kingdom of God, for the Gospel, and for God's glorious plan of salvation?
- 11. This week, how have the verses from this study helped you be joyful in the Lord?
